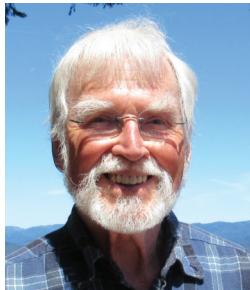

ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Christian Grube, Artistic Director and Conductor of the Santa Cruz Chorale since July 2006, is emeritus professor of choral conducting at the University of Arts,

Berlin. As director of the Berlin State and Cathedral Boys' Choir and the Chamber Choir of the University of Arts, Professor Grube has conducted and toured with his choirs throughout the world. In 1995, because of the diplomatic influence of his work, he was awarded the National Medal for Distinguished Service, the highest civilian honor given by the German government, and in 2010 he was also awarded the "Felix & Fanny Mendelssohn Medal" for "outstanding contributions to the choral life of Berlin." In April, 2022 he received a United States Certificate of Special Congressional Recognition, honoring him and the Santa Cruz Chorale for their benefit concert on behalf of Ukrainian children. Prof. Grube spends part of the year in Europe, holding workshops and serving as guest conductor with various choral groups.

THE SANTA CRUZ CHORALE

Founded in 1983, the Santa Cruz Chorale dedicates itself to two goals: presenting its audiences with distinctive, exciting concerts of choral works from diverse periods, and giving its singers the chance to experience the delight and artistic growth that come from making music at the highest level. The Chorale has recorded five CDs under maestro Grube and has toured in Italy, Croatia, and Spain.

The Chorale's 40-some members, who live throughout Santa Cruz County and beyond, join the ensemble by audition. Although several are professional musicians, all volunteer their time, and all are amateurs in the original sense of that word—people who seriously pursue an art for the love of it.

Christian Grube has been our conductor and artistic director since 2006.

PROGRAM NOTES, TEXTS AND TRANSLATIONS

In celebration of Palestrina's 500th birthday

Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina is considered the leading composer of late 16th-century Europe, and five hundred years after his birth we pay tribute to him with our presentation of the most famous of his over 105 masses, the "Missa Papae Marcelli." This beloved mass (honoring Pope Marcellus II, who died in 1555) was sung at the papal coronation masses, the last of which was of Paul VI in 1963.

"Missa Papae Marcelli" was published in 1567, at a time when the musical liturgy of the Church was becoming more and more secularized. Sacred texts were set to the tunes and in the styles of certain motets, madrigals and chansons, and such music, said the Church fathers, was mere entertainment that distracted attention from the words. They demanded that the sense of sacredness be restored to the Church and to what was appropriate for the mass, whereby the clarity of texts was of foremost importance.

Palestrina knew the human voice and choral singing from early childhood, having been first a choirboy at the basilica of Santa Maria Maggiore in Rome (where Pope Francis has now been laid to rest). As a young adult he became musical director of the Julian Chapel choir, and several years later he was promoted to singer in the Pontifical Choir. One hears how intimately he knew and revered the texts he set to music, and what care he took not only that the words were understandable, but that the music carrying them created an atmosphere that intensified their spiritual meaning.

The "Missa Papae Marcelli" is composed in a combination of polyphony and homophony—polyphony being reserved mainly for the "Kyrie" and "Agnus Dei" (and to some extent for the "Sanctus-Benedictus"), which, despite the staggered entrances of the voices and overlapping texts in polyphony, have few enough words that they will always be understood. The "wordiest" parts of the mass—the "Gloria" and "Credo"—are set mainly in homophony, with all voices singing the same words at the same time. These texts thus remain clear, despite minor overlaps and decorations that stress certain words. Please listen to how the flow of Palestrina's music always perfectly follows the cadences of the spoken word, while musical emphases underline key theological passages.

In the centuries that have passed since the Mass was composed, traditions involving such music have obviously changed greatly. Masses composed in Palestrina's day were intended only for use in the divine service and not for performance in concert; in addition, the singers were all male, with boys singing the higher lines. Further, in an actual service the parts of the mass were not sung one after the other, but were interrupted by prayers and psalms, etc. (the same is true in services today, whether the mass text is sung or spoken). Thus in our performance, each part of Palestrina's Mass will be followed by a composition that serves as a quasi commentary on the preceding text. These works, chosen from more modern times, demonstrate both the timelessness of the texts and how differently they have been approached through the centuries—but it is not coincidence that "peace on earth" is a recurrent theme in these interspersed pieces. We like to believe that Palestrina would have approved!

🎵 Cantate Domino canticum novum (SWV 81)

Heinrich Schütz (1585-1672). Text: Psalm 149:1-3

Our program opens with a joyous Psalm setting by one the most important composers of the early Baroque period, who was also a great admirer of Palestrina—German composer Heinrich Schütz. The Psalmist says that we are to praise Him with song and “in the dance,” and with its jubilantly dancing 3/2 rhythm Schütz’s setting does just that!

🎵 Missa Papae Marcelli: Kyrie

Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (1525-1594). (Translations of the mass texts are traditional.)

One could go through the entire Mass, observing the countless ways in which Palestrina’s music underlines the meaning of the text, but this would be beyond the scope of program notes. Only one thought will be mentioned at the very beginning though, which immediately comes to mind when listening to the “Kyrie.” As noted, Palestrina knew that the few words of the “Kyrie” would remain understandable in a polyphonic setting, despite the continuous word overlap in the countless melodic variations sung by all voices. But is this the only reason he chose to set the “Kyrie” in polyphony? Did he perhaps also see the potential in this style to underline the meaning of the words? Did he use the many variations of the calls for mercy—calls that continuously interrupt each other in their eagerness to be heard—as a way of representing the many individual voices of the multitudes calling upon Him?

Glory to God in the Highest

Randall Thompson (1899-1984). Text: Luke 2:14

In this 20th century setting by American composer Randall Thompson, the words “glory to God in the highest” hop and skip with an almost uncontainable joy that reaches a grand climax when the sopranos reach their highest note, singing “highest!” But the tone suddenly changes, as peace gradually envelops all. The phrase “and on earth peace, peace...” is sung with slowly descending, ever quieter notes in a lower range, and with unexpected intervals that invite the listener to envision that peace. But the very thought of peace on earth calls for a repetition of the joyous beginning, and thus the setting ends: “Glory to God in the highest!”.

❧ Beati quorum via

Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924). Text: Psalm 119:3

The Psalm says that those “who walk in the law of the Lord” are “blessed/beati,” which Irish composer Stanford, an Anglican, interprets as referring to those who live according to Christian beliefs (as set forth, e.g., in the Credo). All is blissful in Stanford’s setting, as “beati quorum via integra est,” is sung—always *piano*—in a calmly striding tempo and with serenely wandering melodic lines that seem to imitate the carefree pace of the “blessed/beati” ones that walk through life following His laws. But after His name, “Domini,” is called out in *forte* (the first of only two *fortes* in the entire composition), the mood abruptly changes for a short moment of reflection: the word “beati” is sung (reverently *piano*) with long drawn out notes, first in major, and then—surprisingly—in a sad and painful minor (*pianissimo*). Is this meant as a quiet reminder that the path of the “blessed” will not always be easy? Or does the pain on the word “beati” allude to the pain of His sacrifice, through

which humanity is redeemed and enters the “blessed” state? In any event, after this interlude, the quietly blissful atmosphere of the beginning returns. But as each voice then sings “beati” for the final time, a gradual crescendo begins, which reaches its climax when the sopranos sing “beati” in a beautiful *forte* on their highest note. In a tone of reverent thanks for being “beati/blessed,” the piece ends *pianissimo*, as “Domini” is sung with a heavenward-drifting chord.

❖ **Alleluia**

Randall Thompson

Randall Thompson’s “Alleluia,” consisting of only that one word and a final “amen,” is by far his most popular choral work. In June of 1940 he had been asked to compose a piece for the opening of the new Berkshire Music Center, but instead of a joyous, celebratory work he created this quiet and introspective “Alleluia.” In later years Thompson said he was always getting letters about the “Alleluia,” with people wanting to know

“what it means...how to conduct it...how fast it should go and why it doesn’t work if you sing it loud and fast. It simply doesn’t. The reason is it isn’t the kind of Hallelujah...that Handel had in mind. There are various ways of saying ‘Blessed be the name of the Lord’... : you can say it on your knees or you can say it shouting. You can say it quietly to yourself. This piece was written at the time of the fall of France. I think that Dr. Koussevitzky [who commissioned the work] wanted a rather sensational kind of fanfare, a gesture that really booms and I just didn’t feel like writing it. It was too, too sad.... I mention this to explain why this is not a shouting kind of Alleluia.”

[France fell on June 22, 1940, and Thompson composed his piece in the few days between July 1st and July 5th.]

In Pärt's composition, the Gregorian chant is sung by the altos—a style that harks back to older polyphonic traditions, in which a Gregorian chant is sung as a *cantus firmus* by a lower voice (usually the tenors). The words are sung extremely slowly by all voices, with a meditative pause after each individual syllable of each word ("Da—pa—cem—Do—mi--ne...."). As the sounds echo from all directions, a timeless space gradually opens, and one enters a realm of peace "which passeth all understanding."
